Flat roof replacement

The flat roof over the long corridor leading to the main hall was leaking so severely that it caused flooding to parts of the building. The persistent leak resulted in water ingress to the walls of the main sanctuary which had to be dried out using dehumidifiers and, as a knock-on effect the paint work in the sanctuary was damaged and had to be re-painted. The flat roof has now been replaced.

Building inspection and report

Leaks from the roof and the appearance of a number of cracks in the structure of the building prompted us to engage the services of a structural engineer to undertake a full and comprehensive inspection and to provide us with a report. The report found that the cracks are superficial and can be remedied, however the roof has a number of defects that should be remedied in the short, medium and long term to make it watertight.

Emergency lighting

The emergency lighting was defective and could not be repaired so it had to be replaced. It is now in good working order and should be so for a number of years.

Lift

The lift was defective and needed substantial refurbishment or replacement. It was agreed to have it re-furbished and it is now in good working order.

Entrance Hall (lobby)

The entrance hall was in a very dilapidated condition and needed a facelift to make it more welcoming. It was agreed to revamp the space rendering it fit for purpose and to-date most of the works have been completed. We have removed old carpets and repainted the walls and ceilings to a very high standard. In order to complete the task, we have engaged the services of a professional interior designer who will assist us in choosing the right furnishings and install bespoke benches, welcoming signs and welcome desk. When completed the entrance hall will be multifunctional and can be utilised for meetings, as a relaxing area, as a waiting area or as a café where people can relax enjoying some refreshments.

I wish to pay special tributes to the team for their hard work during this very difficult time - Andrea the church coordinator, Andy our minister, Jean acting secretary and Patrick our handyman.

ISAIAH 58:

Update on Fabric Matters by Ricky Bennett Work completed and ongoing over the past 12 to 18 months

As a Christian I feel privileged to be called by God to do his work and I am happy to serve him. God has called me to serve him and others and to lead by example as part of our church community. To that end, I have undertaken the task of helping to keep our building in good order for our members and the community at large.

However, the past year to eighteen months have been very trying with Covid 19 and all the restrictions. Notwithstanding that, by the grace of God the Almighty One, I along with others working as a team have managed to carry out a number of activities for the enhancement of our church buildings.

Church House

We carried out a complete refurbishment of church house, engaged a housing agent and obtained a landlord license from Nottingham City Council. The property is now rented out bringing in funds to support the ministries of the church. The property is well managed by Janet Jones Property Services who find and vet tenants, collect rent and subsequently pay it into the church bank account.

Heating System

The gas central heating system was so old and ineffective. The cost for repairs and replacements were becoming prohibitive and the whole thing was uneconomical. In line with the church environmental policy to dispense with fossil fuel, we set about obtaining professional advice and quotations to replace the old system. After consultations and quotes from five companies our preferred choice was Jigsaw for its reasonable price and their professionalism. The new infrared system was supplied and fitted in April. As Christians we are fulfilling our environmental policy of protecting the planet from harm and preserving it for future generations.

Main Hall

The mail hall flooring have been sanded and re-varnished, the walls re-painted and the ceiling repaired making the space more welcoming for its users.

Toilets and baby changing room

These areas have been redecorated to reasonable standard rendering them more user friendly.

Closed Circuit Television (CCTV)

This system was installed as an effective measure to increase the security of the site, staff and members. It is an advanced system that also assists our minister in streaming Sunday and other services to our members and the community.

"Yesterday I went to the supermarket. There is always a homeless person sitting on the ground. I always speak to them and give them the pound from the trolley.

It was raining heavily when I went to the car and back with my trolley and I got quite wet. My shoe was leaking and my foot was swishing about. I must have looked pretty bad for when I went to the homeless chap, he asked if he could give me a sandwich!!! He didn't want money for it. It was a nice chicken and bacon club sandwich, but he was vegetarian, so I could have it. I accepted it

and thanked him very much and gave the coin I planned to give and we had a chat. Anyway, I thought I would have it (today) for my birthday lunch with gratitude and thank God for all my blessings; particularly eating it in my own home and not having to sit on the ground begging."



I pray that we all learn how to be God's hands, giving and receiving in love because I believe so much joy comes from this.

An extract from the June prayer letter of Pippa and Toby Vokuhl

For more than a month now we are back in housebound lockdown. Covid is again hitting Nepal and the health system a lot harder than before.



Hospitals are full and there are oxygen shortages. When so many people we know suffer from the illness, and some badly, it is easy to be frightened.

Today's newsletter is entitled 'Of Fright and Freedom' for a reason. As Christians we may be frightened for precious people and for ourselves at times, but we also carry knowledge of a special freedom, as per John 8:36:

"So if the Son sets you free, you are truly free."

According to the BBC, Nepal currently has the highest rate of Covid transmission in the world. Accessing tests is limited and there are no more vaccines at present. Nepal has been back in lockdown for a month. Outdoor exercise is not allowed, and we can only leave the house for food shopping between 7 and 9 AM. These rules were tightened this week, and now grocery shops are shut for 6 days, although we can still buy vegetables and milk from small shops. There are no furlough schemes, no social security, and no NHS. People are, quite literally, starving.

Having recently received a full work visa for a year, Toby is assisting with plans for an oxygen plant at a local hospital. We are grateful that we, though confined to the house, can use our available freedoms and make a difference here and now.

Please join us in prayer:

- that God in his mercy will reveal himself to many through his word and through loving deeds
- with thanks for the (miraculous) receipt of a work visa for Toby
- for church and leaders who are the face of the Christian response
- with thanks that as a family, we are physically well and with gratitude that Pippa and Toby have received vaccinations
- for the gift of peace and endurance. We would love to have the freedom to exercise outside, as we enter the childrens' summer break
- that we all can start forming friendships and find our community here in Kathmandu
- for an improvement of the health situation in the country and the receipt of more vaccine doses; only 2.5% of the population are fully vaccinated.
- for political stability

Thank you. We are pleased to be here, and want to use any freedoms we have to make a difference. As we feel the **fright** and in parallel celebrate the **freedoms** we have, namely freedom in Christ, we are so grateful to be connected to you.
