Message for OCTOBER from Dave Mangan

In my teaching career I watched many lessons taught by many different teachers. I always paid particular attention to the number and type of questions that were asked. I was interested in how challenging the questions were, how patient the teacher was in waiting for an answer, whether the questions asked were the most important for the pupils to understand what was being taught and if they helped the teacher to find out how pupils were thinking.

Jesus asked many searching questions to his disciples and the people he met during his ministry. He asked questions which dealt with people's pain, confusion, or doubt. He asked questions which challenged people's view of the world and themselves.

The two questions asked by Jesus that I personally reflect on the most are

Who do you say that I am? Matthew 16 vs 15 and

What do you want me to do for you? Matthew 20 vs 32

Jesus asked these questions because the answers must come from deep within us. Our answers reveal both the place of Jesus in our lives and what is in our own hearts. They reveal our understanding and our motives, which in turn determine the way we relate to both God and the people around us. Further on in Matthew's Gospel Jesus himself is asked a question,

"Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?"

Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself. 'All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." Matthew 22 vs 36-40

Carrying out Jesus' answer requires a lifetime of work. It involves going on a pilgrimage, following a narrow path through a landscape that can change suddenly and unexpectedly. Sometimes we can stride ahead quickly, at other times we need to take our time and take each footstep carefully.

We journey both individually, as a church and as a nation. Life asks us many questions but as we travel on this pilgrimage together, God is with us.
