His name is JESUS.

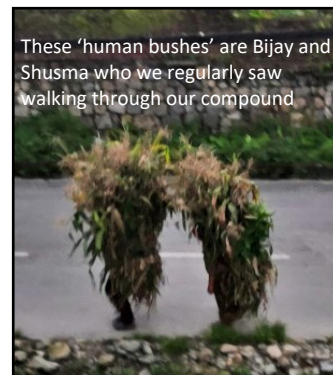
So, if you will also keep your fellowship with this real friend, then you are an army, even when you are alone. The participation of the Holy Spirit remains with us all together forever and ever.

An extract from the October prayer letter of our link BMS World Mission Workers—Pippa and Toby Vokuhl



The last 2 months have been probably the most unsettling for us as a family so far. Our plans to transition to Kathmandu were frustrated by lockdown rules, visa problems and travel restrictions. So, we are currently in Germany and we are preparing to transfer shortly to the UK. We expect to return to Nepal next year to be based in Kathmandu for schooling reasons and to continue supporting our local partner organisation INF from there. Now briefly based in wealthy Germany, the poverty evident in Nepal seems all the more stark. One memory is of Bijay and Shusma, a couple in their 50s, supplying hand cut vegetation



to our local farmer for a small wage. They live near the animals in a shed. Their teenage son recently stole a bike from us. The police got involved and the bike was recovered. However, although we would have wanted it to the contrary, given the 'shame and honour' culture, the son was beaten and sent away to another village, which will have impacted on his future prospects. We would love him to know that he's forgiven, and pray that God will bless this young man.

Reflecting back on work, Toby spent most of his time on projects for Green Pastures Hospital. It has been wonderful to see the improvements with new pathways, a new chapel, a refurbished biomedical workshop and completion of a 16-bed unit for palliative care. It is wonderful to leave Pokhara in the knowledge that buildings and infrastructure remain, and will enable new key services to be provided there for years to come. INF has requested that Toby will continue to input into the development of the Green Pastures site and project manage more projects there.

We would value your prayers for: 1) The INF team and remaining ex-pat staff in Pokhara. 2) Bijay and Shusma, their son, and many others who live 'hand to mouth' in Nepal. Would God reveal himself to many and may churches continue to reach out to the needy. 3) Pray that God will direct our paths while in the UK and lead us back to Nepal. 4) Pray for Jakey, Ella and Millie who are continuing their schooling in changing locations, and for Pippa who is their main learning support.

We close with Isaiah 43:19—*See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.* Maybe you, like us, are challenged by unforeseen circumstances. Let us together trust God that through all changes He is doing a new, good thing, and we are part of it.

End to End

This September I completed a long-held ambition of cycling from Land's End to John O'Groats, one end of the country to the other 1,200 miles with a lot of ups and downs in between. I started in June 2019 so I am not claiming any world records for this and without my support team (Anne) I would never have been able to do it. I was going to tell you about my journey, but along the way I heard a story about another cyclist, true as far as I know, and I thought you would like to hear it.

This cyclist was doing something similar to me, taking a long journey through England to the far North. He arrived in Carlisle in the North of England and in the city lost his way. He saw a lady by the roadside, stopped and asked her for directions. She helped him and said "I live just there. Why don't you come in for a cup of tea? You look thirsty." The man agreed not being sure of what he was letting himself in for. Over the refreshments, the lady started to tell him how her son had died the previous year, went into all the details and wept, and wept,,,,, and wept. The man stayed for an hour and a half just listening feeling powerless in



the face of such grief. But the time came for him to leave so he bid the lady farewell and resumed his journey.

He hadn't gone far before he stopped and thought to himself "I've finished my journey", turned around and went home.

I wonder if the Good Samaritan felt the same way after he had tended to the injured man? Certainly, those who passed by believed that their journey was incomplete until they had achieved the goals they had set themselves – work or family commitments and all the many other things that filled their lives.

How good are we at recognising that sometimes we have missed God's purpose for us or indeed, that we have completed it without realising?

On my long journeys I have learned to ask myself "What was God's point in bringing me to this place?" Perhaps He wanted me to see this, to meet this person, to offer help in this situation or just to be there. Probably many of you think this way already, but I am a bit of a slow learner as well as being a slow cyclist. Fortunately, God hasn't given up on me yet.
