Thought for the Month from our Minister

I have a confession to make!

I have always been somewhat dismissive of leaf-blowers, believing them to be the most pointless power tool ever designed. Until... A couple of months ago, I was trying to clear an entire Autumn's worth of leaves from my driveway, which is mainly gravel, so difficult to sweep. I gave in, and in spite of my previous cynicism, I borrowed a leaf blower.

I discovered 2 things: firstly, that a leaf blower is in fact a superb tool for gathering all your leaves into one place so they can be swept up into a bin. Secondly, and this caught me off-guard, how difficult it was to control the air flow from the leaf blower. If you're not careful, you can end up with a huge whirling mass of leaves just blowing around everywhere with no sense of direction. At one point I felt like I was in the eye of a storm with leaves just circling me with no hope of ever regaining control.

For a brief moment, this became an enlightening experience, as I recalled the words of Jesus, speaking to Nicodemus in John's gospel: *The wind blows wherever it pleases. You hear its sound, but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So it is with everyone born of the Spirit.*

We cannot contain, restrict or control the movement of God's Spirit. But when we give ourselves to God in faith, we become part of that movement. It's not always comfortable, sometimes scary, and occasionally even feels chaotic. As Christians, we may be tempted to try and bring the movement of the Spirit under control, so we can keep things neat and tidy, but there's beauty and creativity in the apparent chaos.

As we move forward as a church, let's be bold in looking for signs of God's Spirit moving, and instead of trying to restrict and contain it, so that we feel safe, maybe see the beauty of the swirling leaves and allow ourselves to be caught up in the wonder of God's work.

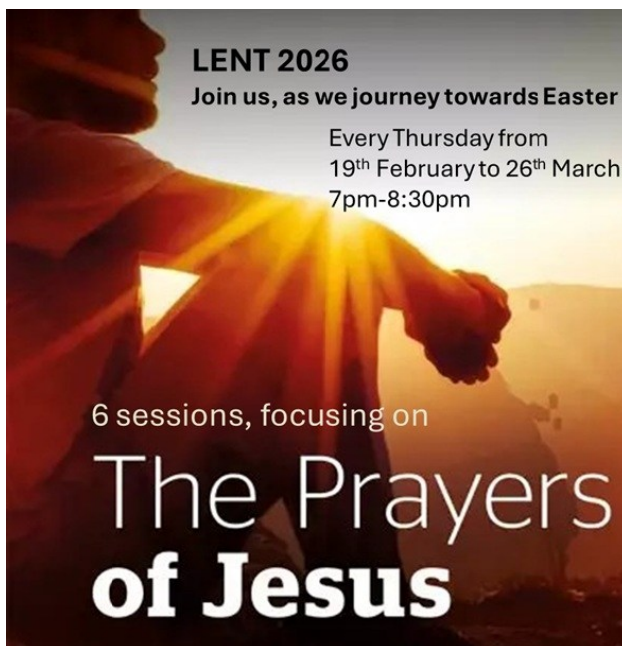

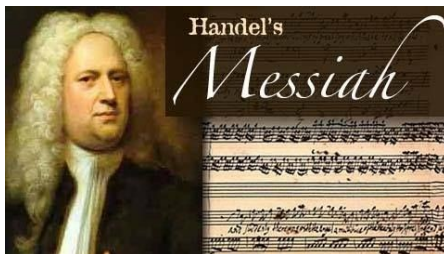

Heavenly Music

On a Saturday evening in early December last year, Joan and I attended a performance of Handel's *Messiah*. This was presented by the Nottingham Harmonic Society which supplied the chorus of nearly 200, ably supported by 4 professional singers and an orchestra of 22 professional musicians.

For the benefit of readers not familiar with *Messiah*, it is a most wonderful artistic creation, the words of which are entirely those of the Bible and the music that accompanies those words is some of the best written in the 18th century, by any composer of that time. It recounts the whole of the earthly life of Jesus, from the prophecies of Isaiah to the triumphant choruses of Revelation, and everything in between.



Handel's *Messiah* is more than a piece of music, it is a monument of western civilisation. It has, across the two and a half centuries since it was written, acquired an enormous status, and has been performed by amateurs and professionals in both small-scale numbers, and occasionally in absurdly large-scale presentations. There is no prescribed or "official" version, but in recent decades there has been a movement towards the style and the scale of 18th century performances.

The remarkable thing is that it was originally written by Handel, a prolific and financially successful composer, as just another item in his catalogue of work. That it was not only an instant success, but has outlasted all his other works involving singing, strongly suggests its Providential prompting.

Jesus himself. He is our Christmas.
